
Identifying Type II Diabetes

- Increased thirst
- Frequent urination
- Extreme hunger
- Blurred vision
- Fatigue
- Unexplained weight loss

- Slow-healing sores
- Tingling, burning, or numbness in feet and hands
- Pain in joints or muscles
- Frequent infections
- Diabetic ketoacidosis
